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Vet Pet Program at Ronald McDonald House

Just two blocks from the School is a very special place, the Ronald McDonald House at 3925 Chestual Street. This "house that love hull?" is a home away from from for the many families with children with life-threatening illnesses who come to Philadelphia's Childrens Hospital for in- or outpatient reasument. The concept of providing a home-like armosphere for the families and youngsters duting treatment sessions began with the Philadelphia house. Now there are 120 such houses nationwide, a number in Canada, Australia and Europe.

Staffed by volunteers, the Philadelphia house can accommodate up to 19 families. About two-and-a-half years ago Nicole Pirkey (Class of 1990) approached the bouse with the idea of having students and their pets visit the children and their families at the house. At first the house manager allowed only dogs, but by the third visit site told the students they could bring "any unimal that fit through the front dogs."

"The 'Vet Pet Program," as it is affectionately known by the Rottald McDonald staff, is an informal educational experience," said Nicole Pirkey.

"We bring animals of all types who we determine to be culm enough and friendly enough to visit. These range from all kinds of exitie pets (snakes, guinea pigs, pet mis, birds) to dogs with special talants of ones that are especially large, small, cute ese. All animals are serected carefully and require a recent negative stool specimen, current vaccination status, and a flex bath the day of the visit. We must be very careful because the immune status of many of these children is compromised. Subsequently, we do not bring gata or kittens (for fear of toxopiasmosis exposure) or any species of exories that are known to harbor sub-eliment diseases that are potential toonuses."

The student volunteers by to make the children and parents laugh, teach them something about animals and encourage them to touch, hold and play with different types of animals. This requires the student to observe the child and animal at all times to make sure there is no poking of eyes, pulling of tails, etc. The youngsteen learn about the animals present, sing





songs and find out about veterinarium and what they do. "It's incredibly rewarding for everyone (stational and children) but at times it can be unexpectedly sad," explained Ms. Pirkey. "One little girl, happily playing with a puppy, was telling me about her younger brother who was in the hospital new for the fifth time very ill with leukemin. She mentioned that she wished her lattle brother could be with her because the lovest pupples so. She then suddenly became very serious and saked, "Are there pupples in heaven?" This was after we had a talk about velerinar-

lans and I remember thinking that maybe she considered me to be the expert ligure on the subject. So I replied, 'Yes, I really think there are,' That memory will stay with me for a long time."

The Ronald McDonald House staff is enthusiastic about the 'Vet Per Program.' 'It's always a great night.' said Linda Oglivle, house manager. 'The majority of families come from small towns where pets are part of life. Having the unimals and students visit provides a home-like comfort. I remember one little girl who enddled a puppy all exemus. She was acheduled for a procedure the next morning and the warm, soft pup gave her comfort.'

"I thick it is so very important for veterinations and veterinary students to be aware of how much jo) a puppy brings a child or how fuscinating it is to touch a snake for the lirst time and feel how evol and smooth its skin is." said Nicole Pirkey.

Ms. Pirkey will graduate next your but she is confident that the 'Vet Per Proutant' is well established and will be one of the student outreach projects for many years to come.
